Vice President, Paul Cezanne spoke about an upcoming event called "Freeze Your Pilgrims Off". Presentation

Ed Ting, our speaker gave an extremely informative presentation "Talking about Telescopes". Ed publishes a comprehensive telescope and binocular review on his website www.scopereviews.com. Ed is an active member of the New Hampshire Astronomical Society and has written for *Sky & Telescope* magazine. Ed's presentation focused on practical aspects of purchasing both binoculars and telescopes. Ed showed simple methods for evaluating binoculars in order to obtain the best products for astronomical observing. Next, various types of telescopes were discussed. Ed pointed out the advantages and disadvantages of refractor, reflector, Schmidt Cassegrain and Dobsonian telescopes. Ed described Go To mounts, portability, optical coatings, CCD's for each category of telescope.

Observatory Report

Mike Hunter reported that the 16 inch Meade telescope in the observatory has reached magnitude 15.1.
